Abraham was a nomad before he was a patriarch. [Genisis 12: 1] During his wanderings in the dessert, he was inspired and transformed by the land, by his experiences, and by God, Feiler, a modern pilgrim, also explored the paths of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Moses and engages the reader in his adventure. Initially, he was interested in the geology, history, and archeology related to his journey, which covered three continents and 10,000 miles. An archeologist, Avner Goren, who furnishes invaluable information for both the author and the reader, accompanied him. Their conversations with current residents of the regions visited provides an understanding of how they continue to be influenced by the stories of the Hebrew Bible and how they remain connected to the land. Clearly, the land is more than geography; it is imbued with meaning.

As **Walking the Bible** progresses, Feiler's perspective changes from that of an observer as he struggles to discern whether the saga recorded in the Pentateuch is "merely" oral tradition or is historically accurate. He concludes that a final determination cannot be made. Nevertheless, the stories were regarded as true and became a source of cultural cohesion and of religious values. Gradually, Feiler, a secular Jew, understands the five books of Moses not only as treasured ancient writing, but also as enduring reality... and he reconnects with his own spiritual heritage.

This book is an engaging two-dimensional saga. It is an adventure that immerses the reader in the experience of visiting Mount Sinai and other physical spaces that have had transcendent meaning for centuries. **Walking the Bible** is also inspirational for readers who have a faith tradition. Many Christians will be enlightened by a significant review of the Old Testament. This book is recommended because it is informative, thoughtful, moving, and readable.

## 2017 Bethlehem on Broad Street (BOBS) Follow-up

On Saturday, December 9, 18 volunteers from Worthington UMC loaded 213 boxes filled with food and \$10 Kroger gift cards from the POD to vehicles, and delivered them to Broad Street UMC for the Bethlehem on Broad Street (BOBS) Christmas charity event. These food boxes were a part of approximately 1,200 total boxes which were donated by six UM churches. The "wall" of food exceeded our expectations and we were humbled with the generous response from our WUMC family. Even though there was a chill in the air, our hearts were warmed by the kindness of our helpers. On Saturday, December 16, another 23 volunteers helped distribute



the boxes to needy families in the central Columbus area during the Christmas party at Broad Street UMC.

On behalf of those whose lives were blessed with food for about four days, we thank you for your generosity and caring. Thanks to everyone who helped get the egg boxes, filled a food box, staffed the ministry table and POD, checked and packed the boxes, shopped for food to complete boxes, loaded and delivered the boxes, and distributed them at the Christmas party. Special thanks to Wendy Raab and the CPC staff, families and children who completed 25 boxes. Thanks also to Weaver Brothers Eggs in Versailles, OH for donating 225 sturdy egg boxes for this ministry and to PODS (Portable on Demand Storage) for donating the POD to help us securely store the boxes and to make it easier for folks to drop off their donations. Finally, thank you to everyone who donated cash, gift cards and food to help us make this outreach ministry a success!

## Making a Difference: Bethlehem on Broad

"I'm from Worthington United Methodist Church. How may I help?" These words were all it took to make a difference in the lives of others. Like so many others from our church and other local churches, I showed up at Broad Street United Methodist Church and helped deliver boxes of food and supplies to families for Christmas. The boxes had been donated by local churches (over 200 boxes were donated by WUMC), and now it was time to get the boxes into the hands of families that needed them. There were several jobs available, but my assignment was to pick up a box of supplies and take it to a family's car in the adjacent parking lot. During the shift (which was less than two hours), I delivered several boxes with the solemn understanding that our church (and others) were providing for families that needed help.

While holding boxes and talking with families, I reflected on the impact of this service opportunity. We weren't just carrying boxes with our hands. We were using our hands as Christ would have encouraged his disciples. Our hands were carrying out His ministry. Our hands were Christ's hands. It was a powerful moment. Bethlehem on Broad was one of the most rewarding service activities I've ever participated in. For anyone who wants to do something to help make a difference, I encourage you to check the Outreach bulletin board outside the church library for monthly opportunities to make a difference in all kinds of ways and all kinds of settings. 
