School Inequality

Recently the MacArthur Foundation announced this years recipients of its annual fellowship referred to as the "Genius Grant".

One of the recipients is Nikole Hanna-Jones, a staff writer for The New York Times Magazine. In announcing her award, the MacArthur Foundation described why she was chosen:

"For chronicling the persistence of racial segregation in American society, particularly in education, and reshaping national conversations around education reforms"

After reading her articles and listening to her interviews, it is clear to me why she won this prestigious award. She points to the reality of the state of K-12 school systems in virtually every major metropolitan area across the country where there exists a dual system of educational opportunity leaving kids of color and kids living in poverty primarily attending significantly less effective, and in many cases failing, schools, compared to kids living in more affluent neighborhoods primarily in the white suburbs.

We don't have to look far to see these issues in our own back yard. Although we know there are wonderful teachers and schools in the Columbus Public School System, we can contrast CPS as a whole with the surrounding suburbs such as Worthington. And yes, it does cost a lot more to live in Worthington, but children are not responsible for where they live, and they do deserve an equal chance, especially in the critical early years of their lives. Hanna-Jones points out the dilemma that we all want what is best for our own kids, but we also face steep societal costs by ignoring this growing inequality. We can no longer afford to just look away. We must look to our faith to help us find answers. If you are interested in learning more I would encourage you to google "Nikole Hanna-Jones".

Food Box List

Please note that all food must be in cans or plastic containers -- **no glass**. Also **do not add extra items** or fresh produce to the box. Store sizes vary so come as close as possible.

- 1 \$10 gift card (Kroger) taped to inside wall of box
- 3 15-oz. cans assorted vegetables
- 2 29-oz. cans assorted fruits
- 2 24-oz. CANS spaghetti sauce
- 2 1-lb. boxes spaghetti
- 1 6-pack Ramen noodles (no cups)
- 1 14-oz. box instant mashed potatoes
- 1 16-oz. box saltine crackers
- 1 16-oz. box cereal
- 1 20-oz. can beef stew
- 1 13-oz. package cookies
- 1 16-oz. PLASTIC jar peanut butter
- 1 20-oz. PLASTIC jar/squeeze jelly
- 1 roll paper towels
- 1 small 4-pack toilet paper

Before filling your box please tape the bottom by folding in short flaps first then sealing with packing tape along long flaps. Try to evenly distribute weights and leave the top unsealed.

Please bring your donations and boxes to the "PODS" container by the Church garage in the east parking lot before and after services on Sunday, Nov. 26 and Dec. 3 (or to the Church office weekdays through Tuesday, Dec. 5).
